Although the term has been used in Europe since the 12th and 13th centuries, it is associated in more recent history with the French Revolution and its aftermath.

Evidence of anti-clericalism. In 1512 John Colet, the Dean of St Paul's, preached the opening sermon to a meeting of the Convocation of Canterbury. In this speech he emphasised the need for reform and blamed the current state on the clergy. In 1529, before the opening of the Parliament, Simon Fish, a Lutheran and lawyer, wrote a pamphlet A Supplication for the Beggars, which was strongly anti-clerical.

ANTICLERICALISM. The idea of "anticlericalism" as such does not belong to early modern Europe. The word describes a range of attitudes and behaviors toward clergy, ranging from mild criticism to loud protest and violence. Anticlericalism was in evidence both in the Middle Ages and the early modern era; it was expressed by laity and clergy alike, whether Catholic or Protestant; and it arose in response to actions, policies, and attitudes perceived as contrary to the ideals and duties of the ...
