The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) is a federal agency that establishes regulations to protect employees from unsafe working conditions. These regulations, which are also known as OSHA standards, can vary from industry to industry so it is important for an employer within a particular industry to know the standards that apply.

OSHA (The Occupational Safety and Health Administration) mandates that all dental offices have an infection control training manual available for training new employees as well as for implementing and maintaining OSHA standards. This manual must be updated on an annual basis.

According to OSHA, the most critical documents that a dental practice must have in place are safety plans for exposure control (infection prevention and control), hazard communication (chemical safety), and general workplace safety (includes identification of trip and fall hazards, safe operation of equipment, and prevention of workplace violence).

In a large dental workplace, a dental nurse may be appointed as safety representative under the Act for the purpose of improving liaison within the practice about Health and Safety matters. However, many dental nurses begin their careers as young trainees in the dental environment, so the following two sets of regulations are specifically important in protecting their welfare.

Ideally, dental treatment should be provided in individual patient rooms, whenever possible. For dental facilities with open floor plans, to prevent the spread of pathogens there should be: At least 6 feet of space between patient chairs. Physical barriers between patient chairs.

Dental healthcare personnel should stay informed and regularly consult with the state or local health department for region-specific information and recommendations, and should monitor trends in local case counts and deaths, especially for populations at higher risk for severe illness.

Summary of CDC COVID-19 Guidance for Dental Services

The CDC's Guidelines for Infection Control in Dental Health-Care Settings-2003 recommends the following: 1) Wear a surgical mask and eye protection with solid side shields or a face shield to protect mucous membranes of the eyes, nose, and mouth during procedures likely to generate splashing or spattering of blood or other body fluids; 2) Change masks between patients, or during patient treatment if the mask becomes wet.

COVID-19 FAQ for Dental Practitioners | OSHA Review

OSHA's general industry standards concerning exposure to bloodborne pathogens apply to cleaning activities in a dentist's office. For example, standard number 1910.1030(d)(4)(iii) requires all equipment and working surfaces that come into contact with blood or other potentially infectious material - which includes saliva in dental procedures - be cleaned and decontaminated.
